WOMEN IN MUSIC 2022 COMPOSER IN FOCUS: FLORENCE B. PRICE

Florence Price is among a growing list of prolific African American composers whose music is being rediscovered by 21st-century classical music audiences. Born to a musical mother and a father who was one of the handful of Black dentists in the United States at the time, Price was a precocious musician and scholar. She gave her first public piano performance at age four or five, published her first composition at age 11, and graduated from high school in Little Rock as valedictorian in 1903. She went on to study piano and organ at the New England Conservatory (tellingly, she claimed to be Mexican rather than African American on her application, figuring her race would preclude her admission). After teaching stints in Little Rock and Atlanta, Price left the South for Chicago in 1927, when an especially horrific lynching in her community was the final straw for many Black families in Little Rock who had the means to join the Great Migration. The move was fortuitous. Price quickly immersed herself in the rich musical life of the city, where she became known as a performer, teacher, and composer. Her major breakthrough came in 1932, when her Symphony No. 1 won the Rodman Wanamaker Prize for a symphonic composition by an African American composer. That same year, her piano sonata won in the piano composition category, and two pieces won Honorable Mention in those categories, including Ethiopia's Shadow in America. These wins not only brought considerable financial reward but also led to a premiere of the Symphony No. 1 by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra—the first performance of a symphonic work by an African American woman by a major American orchestra. The piece was exceptionally well received, bringing Price to national prominence. She would go on to write four symphonies, three large-scale concertos, numerous other orchestral works, and hundreds of vocal and piano pieces.

In a *New York Times* piece in 2018, scholar Micaela Baranello detailed Price's gift for self-advocacy and meticulous organization of her scores. After Price's death in 1953, her physical absence led to a rapid drop-off in performances of her works. But the 2009 discovery of a treasure trove of orderly, unpublished scores in Price's old summer home began an enthusiastic renaissance of Price's music. www.svmusicfestival.org/

Guest Composer



Georgina Derbez

Georgina Derbez Roque was born in México City in 1968. She studied piano and composition at the Escuela Superior de Música. Her works have been selected for performance in various festivals of new music, including the prestigious Manuel Enríquez Forum of New Music in México City and the Festival of Contemporary Music of León, México.

Georgina Derbez's music has been performed throughout Europe and in Brazil, Japan, Canada, and the United

States, and she has collaborated extensively with Spanish interpreters: Alberto Rosado, Clara Andrada, the SIGMA PROJECT saxophone quartet, the Brower Trio of Valencia and the Trio Arbós of Madrid. She was chosen by the Utopik Ensemble in France to represent her country in a concert dedicated to contemporary Mexican music. Her catalog includes works for solos, duets, trios, string quartet, chamber ensembles and symphony orchestra.

Recordings of her music include: Music of Women Composers of the Americas (Quindecim Records, 2000) and Canciones de Luna, Euram Records, 1999). Georgina Derbez has received four grants from the Foundation for Culture and the Arts (FONCA). She currently serves as a teacher of composition, analysis and orchestration at the Superior School of Music of the INBA (Nacional Institute of the Fine Arts), México City.

Guest Organists



Anne Laver

Anne Laver's performance activities have taken her across the United States, Europe, Scandinavia, Central America, and Africa. She has been a featured recitalist and clinician at regional and national conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the Organ Historical Society, and the Westfield Center for Historical Keyboard Studies. In 2010, she was awarded second prize in the prestigious American Guild of Organists' National Young Artist Competition in Organ Performance (NYACOP). Anne's performances have been aired on nationally syndicated radio programs, including WXXI FM's With Heart and Voice and American Public Media's Pipedreams. Her debut recording, "Reflections of Light" was released on the Loft label in 2019.

Anne is Assistant Professor of Organ and University Organist at Syracuse University's Setnor School of Music. In this role, she teaches organ lessons and classes, serves as artistic director for the Music and Message Series, accompanies the Hendricks Chapel Choir, and plays for chapel services and special university events. She is also Visiting Professor of Organ at the Eastman School of Music. Anne has over twenty years of experience in church music, having led volunteer and professional choir programs in a variety of parishes in New York, Wisconsin, and The Netherlands.

Anne's teachers include Mark Steinbach, Jacques van Oortmerssen, Hans Davidsson, William Porter, and David Higgs. She holds an undergraduate degree from Brown University and graduate degrees from the Eastman School of Music.



Nicole Keller

Nicole Keller is an active, award-winning solo and chamber music recitalist and clinician in the United States and abroad. She enjoys exploring all aspects of organ repertoire, especially pairing new music for the instrument with the staples of the repertoire. She performs regularly as a solo and collaborative artist on the organ, piano and harpsichord, exploring organ duo repertoire with Timothy Olsen, Kenan Professor of Organ at the University of North Carolina School of the Arts. She is on faculty at the Baldwin Wallace University Conservatory of Music and was recently appointed as Associate Organist at Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland.

Ms. Keller's extensive church music experience includes work with volunteer and professional choirs and instrumental

ensembles devoted to the highest level of music for worship. She is devoted to the development of amateur and volunteer choristers and musicians of every age level.

Ms. Keller received the Performer's Certificate and the Master of Music Degree in Organ Performance and Literature at the Eastman School of Music, and the Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance from the Baldwin Wallace Conservatory of Music.

Leonard Hayes

Leonard Hayes is currently a doctoral student at the University of Southern California where he serves as a graduate teaching assistant in the department of Keyboard Studies. He previously served as the Head of Piano Studies and Assistant Director in the Music Conservatory at the Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts (Dallas, TX).

Among his many honors, Mr. Hayes was awarded first prize in the 2015 National Association of Negro Musicians Piano Competition. As a recitalist and chamber musician Mr. Hayes has performed across the U.S. and abroad at venues as diverse as the Sweelinkzaal at the Conservatorium van Amsterdam, the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion, Hammond Hall at the Winspear Opera House, Steinway Hall, Hatch Hall and Kilbourn Hall (Eastman School of Music). As a scholar, he was awarded the prestigious 2015 Links Scholarship which recognizes the "extraordinary talent and academic achievement" of an African-American scholar musician.

A deeply committed teacher Mr. Hayes was named a Steinway & Sons Educational Partner and received the Steinway's prestigious 2017 Top Teacher Award for his commitment to piano education in the Dallas community. Mr. Hayes received his Bachelor of Music Degree from the

Conservatory of Music at Lawrence University with additional studies at the Conservatorium van Amsterdam and a Master of Music from the Eastman School of Music. His teacher - mentors include Antoinette Perry, Douglas Humpherys, Catherine Kautsky, and T.J. Lymenstull.
